What is quality improvement?

Quality improvement (QI) is not just a method or model, but more an approach to personal or organisation learning, development and improvement. QI helps to bring a systematic approach to tackling complex problems by:

- Focusing on outcomes
- Flattening hierarchies
- Giving everyone a voice
- Bringing staff and service users together to improve and redesign the way that care is provided



What is quality improvement?

- QI is the application of a systematic approach that uses specific techniques to improve quality. Although there is a range of approaches that fit under this umbrella, they all have the following in common:
- The concept of a cycle of improvement which involves:
 - Problem definition and diagnoses
 - Planning and testing of change ideas
 - Data collection and analysis
 - Implementation
 - Evaluation
- A set of tools and techniques that support individuals to plan and implement improvements
- A recognition of the importance of engaging stakeholders, including patients and carers
- Recognition of the importance of culture and the need for leadership clinical and management.

Why does QI matter?

Every health care system is built on a complex network of care processes and pathways. The quality of the care delivered by the system depends to a large extent on how well this network functions, and how well the people who provide and manage care work together.

The overall aim is simple: to provide high-quality care to patients and improve the health of our population. Yet, as every patient and professional can testify, for every process or pathway that works well, there is another that causes delay, wasted effort, frustration or even harm.

Quality improvement is about giving the people closest to issues affecting care quality the time, permission, skills and resources they need to solve them. It involves a systematic and coordinated approach to solving a problem using specific methods and tools with the aim of bringing about a measurable improvement.

East Midlands AHSN

The East Midlands Patient Safety Collaborative (part of the AHSN) has been promoting a quality improvement approach through coaching and supporting staff for more than five years, and experience shows that co-producing and tailoring resources to the needs of the care home sector were vital to enable staff to better connect and apply QI.

Two new resources have been created by the East Midlands AHSN, available for care homes to use. 'React To' is a series of video-based training resources developed by healthcare professionals, and the latest two additions focus on 'Managing Deterioration' and 'Quality Improvement'.

The React To model is already well-known and used by social care staff from across the UK and is made up of a series of videos and supporting resources, which have been specifically designed for the social care sector. The series has been praised for being accessible and easy to view.

The Improvement Academy has developed <u>online entry Bronze level</u> <u>training</u>. This training is FREE and available for ALL healthcare providers and commissioners and anyone else who is interested in supporting or delivering improvement, and is available either via our on-line training platform, or through the National Electronic Staff Record.

Content of the Bronze QI training

A key objective of the training is to help participants understand how and why everyone has a role to play and can contribute to Quality Improvement in their work area.

- Module 1: Introduction to Quality Improvement Training (5 mins)
- Module 2: Quality Improvement in Yorkshire and Humber (30 mins)
- Module 3: How can I improve patient care? (30 mins)
- Module 4: Your Model for Improvement (30 mins)

Modules 2, 3 and 4 end with a short quiz and the final module is followed by a short evaluation questionnaire. On completion of ALL of the modules, a certificate of completion can be printed off. A User Guide is also available although site navigation is explained throughout.



North East and North Cumbria AHSN

The Improvement Toolkit is for staff who work in healthcare, leading teams/directorates/departments involved in culture and/or quality improvement work.

It is split into two main sections:

- Culture: This section aims to share with you practical ways you can evaluate the culture in your team and the steps you can take to make and sustain improvements
- Quality Improvement: This section provides you with an approach to help you improve quality, measure its success, and ensure improvements are sustained

Both sections are supported by an additional section which shares some useful quality improvement tools and techniques which you may wish to use when looking at culture and/or quality improvement work.

SPACE QI training helps upskill care home staff on My Home Life Leadership and Development Programme

The West Midlands Academic Health Science Network's SPACE QI was recently incorporated into the four day My Home Life Leadership and Professional Support Programme, to further upskill 50 care home staff and managers across Birmingham, Coventry, Hereford, Worcester and London, and support them to develop best practice in their care settings. The feedback was very positive!

The SPACE (Safer Provision and Caring Excellence) programme was originally a two-year large-scale quality improvement pilot programme in 35 care homes across the West Midlands sponsored by the West Midlands Patient Safety Collaborative.

It aimed to upskill care home staff through training them in basic QI techniques and methodologies which empower staff to identify solutions to common problems within their care settings.

A key objective of the training is to help participants understand how and why everyone has a role to play and can contribute to Quality Improvement in their work area.


- Module 1: Quality in the NHS (10 mins)

- Module 3: How do you improve patient care? (10 mins)
- Module 4: What does using the Model for Improvement look like in practice? (10 mins)

When you have completed Bronze training you may want to consider attending the Yorkshire and Humber **Improvement Academy Silver QI training**. This course is delivered virtually and focuses on a practical application of the 'Model for Improvement' using a detailed improvement case study.
